## FOREIGN STUDENT ENROLLMENT 1963-64

We are pleased to present a brief summary of the foreign student enrollment at Cornell for the academic year 1963-64. Our enrollment of foreign students has increased by 8% over last year and represents the largest number ever to enroll at Cornell. This year we have 951 students representing 84 countries. The three largest national groups are Canada 147, China 85, and India 80.

The percentage of foreign students to total student enrollment is 7.8. Graduate students (704) make up 74% of the foreign student enrollment. The foreign graduate students comprise 25.1% of the total graduate student enrollment. This includes those students enrolled in the Graduate School and Master's degree candidates in the Graduate Schools of Business and Public Administration, and Aerospace Engineering.

Our undergraduate foreign student enrollment increased by only 18 students over last year. Foreign students represent 2.7% of the total undergraduate enrollment. The School of Hotel Administration maintains the highest percentage (12.9) of foreign students of any undergraduate division followed by the College of Architecture with 5.8%, and the College of Agriculture with 4.2%.

For those interested in some of the national figures related to enrollment of foreign students, we quote some of the findings from the 1962-63 census conducted by the Institute of International Education and summarized in their publication OPEN DOORS. There were over 64,000 students from 149 countries studying in 1805 institutions in 1962-63. The University of California had the largest number of foreign students (3108). Howard University had the highest percentage (16.7) of foreign students to total enrollment, followed by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (12.6), Harvard (8.7), and Cornell (6.5). The largest number of foreign students (14,257) were enrolled in engineering, while the smallest number (2,205) were in agriculture. The Far East sends the greatest number of foreign students to the U.S. (27,000 or 37%). Although there were only 5,000 African students in the U.S., they showed the greatest rate of increase (27%).
